



Fredericksburg has attractions for every season. In the spring, there are wildflowers, we just finished another delicious summer peach season, and we're heading into our fall party season. We enjoyed another great Gillespie County Fair (the oldest continuous county fair in the state), and we'll soon "Polka, Polka, Polka," as Louis Prima sang, at Oktoberfest. Later that month, we'll return to Marktplatz for the Fredericksburg Food & Wine Festival.

GoFredTX has been there for them all and has been for decades. We've been through iterations, first publishing a newsprint Visitors Guide in 1978 as a supplement to the Fredericksburg Standard. In 2013, we evolved into a magazine and rebranded last spring as GoFredTX, which captures the fun and playfulness of our town as well as our growing digital brand. Forty-seven years is a long time to tout our special area. Our forward-looking

publishers began doing so just as the first Bed and Breakfasts opened locally. Like everything else, our downtown business district has changed, and E-Rock has become one of the state parks system's most-visited sites. Waking up to coffee on a private deck while giraffes play nearby or having an afternoon interaction with docile white rhinoceros is what guests can expect at Longneck Manor

The Hill Country is transformed into the savannah in this special place. While a giraffe suite is available, guests can also view tons of wildlife at this unexpected sanctuary.

The nonprofit, conservation foundation has a primary goal to raise awareness and funds for its animals' wild counterparts. Its mission is to ensure the wild animals' survival, but also their habitats.

Opened in 2021, Longneck Manor is the passion project of Roderick (Rick) Barongi, former director of the Houston Zoo. He chose the Hill Country because of its similar climate to the African areas where these animals originated.

The special place has hosted "wine and giraffe" events, "Make a Wish" programs, and umpteen wedding proposals, anniversary and birthday celebrations.

Reservations are required, but guests will have a one-of-a-kind experience whether on a day visit or overnight excursion.

Grand Tasting tickets and badges are available for the event, set for Oct. 21-26 at Marktplatz and other locations during that week.

A portion of proceeds to the Hill Country Hospitality Relief Fund, supporting local hospitality professionals.

The event, taken over by the Fredericksburg Chamber of Commerce in 2024, is a revamped look at the best food and wine offerings in the heart of Texas wine country.

A June Preview Week peek at events and offerings helped raise \$40,000 for the Community Foundation of the Texas Hill Country's Flood Relief Fund. These monies help recovery efforts

for the community's neighbors to the south in Kerrville and Comfort who suffered through devastating floods over the July 4 weekend.





Barbecue Around the Hill Country


The staff of the Fredericksburg Standard-Radio Post hit seven barbecue joints in Gillespie County on its quest to find the best pits in town.

Before heading out, the staff set parameters. It defined barbecue joints as food vendors offering meat by the pound, with one exception.

At each of the seven venues, two people

tried brisket, ribs, sausage and two sides. As they tasted, the food was labeled according to strengths and weaknesses. Also included was information about pricing and hours of operation.

Their menu has all the barbecue basics. for a wallet-friendly rate. Personal favorites were the jalepeño-cheddar sausage and any of their desserts.

The restaurant is spacious and great for large gatherings, and regularly offers lunch and dinner specials.

Before trying to scratch a barbecue itch on a Friday evening, know that at 4:30 p.m. each week, the restaurant only offers grilled steaks.

Recognized on multiple occasions by Texas Monthly, Eaker Barbecue is known for its unique fusion of Texan and Korean barbecue styles.

Although its list menu prices can be high, the restaurant offers daily rotating specials, ranging from Korean fried chicken sandwiches to hot honey burnt

While everything on the menu is worth the hype, standouts are the gochujang (red chili paste) ribs and the kimchi fried rice. Alternating bites of each are highly recommended.

Be forewarned, the restaurant regularly sells out and closes early, so arrive early.

In short: Breakfast beats lunch offerings. On the west end of town is David's, which opened in 2006.

What sets this locale apart is its breakfast taco and plate offerings, which include huevos rancheros and migas.

Their afternoon barbecue fare has all the staples, with plate combos and by the pound options.

The recommendation is for a double-dipping barbecue day, check out David's for breakfast and another spot for lunch.



JUNEBUG'S BBQ

A newer addition to the Fredericksburg food scene is Junebug's BBQ, part of the Albert Hotel complex.

Unlike other spots in town, Junebug's focuses on dinner offerings and weekend visitors. Their seating is exclusively outside and is somewhat limited. This isn't a rainy day outing or when the whole family is tagging along. With the outdoor venue and a stage, it's a good spot for live music on Friday and Saturday evenings.

The personal favorite menu items were the mac and cheese and potato salad. While they don't have a particular gimmick or twist, their favorites are done right.

LEROY'S TEX MEX BBQ

Calling this particular restaurant a barbecue joint is a bit of a stretch, but it was included for its smoked meats – chopped beef, pulled pork and turkey.

This restaurant takes the Tex in Tex-Mex a little more seriously by adding barbecue offerings, including proper beef cheek barbacoa on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

Leroy's also offers breakfast, a slew of taco options and even a limited menu for dogs, but their fan-favorite menu item is the queso blanco, which has won both years of Fredericksburg Food & Wine Festival's Quesöff.

The favorites were cornbread and sausage. This is a good place to dine in and enjoy the warehouse's other offerings like a coffee bar and shopping.

TOOTHLESS BBQ

In short: This is an affordable hidden gem.

In Toothless BBQ takes a stripped back approach, serving barbecue straight from a food truck right in the middle of Stonewall.

Most impressive were the affordable prices and generous portions.

Toothless took the cake when it came to brisket. It was peppery and balanced without any need for sauce.

While not in Fredericksburg, I think its location makes for a great option for travelers coming down U.S. 290 on a Friday afternoon.

There are some shaded areas near the truck, but no established seating, so bring a lawn chair or take it to-go.

What started as a one-day event in 1981 on the "Market Square" has grown into a three-day nationally recognized celebration of German roots at Marktplatz in Fredericksburg.

The 45th Oktoberfest, set for Friday through Sunday, Oct. 3-5, was named by USA Today as one of the 10 Best in the U.S. The 2025 event is again expected to attract 26,000 visitors, along with 1,400 volunteers.

Sponsored by the Pedernales Creative Arts Alliance (PCAA), since its founding, the family-oriented German event will take place at Marktplatz in downtown Fredericksburg.

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








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Germans looking for a better life risked everything to get to Gillespie County in the mid-1840s. When they arrived, they created a unique German colony in the heart of the Texas Hill Country.

Pioneer Museum and the Gillespie County Historical Society pay tribute to the history of those German emigrants through a series of activities hosted on the museum grounds.

PIONEER MUSEUM


The Pioneer Museum grounds is a combination museum and historical site on 3.5 acres featuring historic homesteads and buildings donated by founding families of Gillespie County.

Among these are a one-room school-house, log cabin, Sunday house, bath house, barn and smokehouse that show-case artifacts and architecture which help to preserve and tell their story.

Also, visitors may browse through the Fredericksburg Volunteer Fire Department Museum which displays pieces of early 20th century firefighting equipment.

ADMISSION

Museum members free \$12 for general admission \$7 for military or seniors \$5 for children Children under five are free.



MARKTPLATZ

Vereins Kirche

Vereins Kirche | pioneermuseum.com

Just two blocks away from the main grounds stands the Vereins Kirche ("Society Church"). The Vereins Kirche is located in the middle of the town square, called Marktplatz. This is a replica of the first public building constructed by the pioneers in Fredericksburg.

The original, built in 1847, served as a combination church, school, and community center for decades. A replica was built in 1935, the project that launched the Gillespie County Historical Society.

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
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

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


Want to know where all the cool kids (and former kids) hang out?



Encounter the History of WWII

National Museum of the Pacific War | pacificwarmuseum.org

The National Museum of the Pacific War offers close-up encounters with the history of the Pacific and Asiatic theaters of World War II through its permanent collection and events throughout the year.

The Smithsonian Affiliate and American Alliance of Museums accredited museum hosts an extensive collection of artifacts, interactive exhibits and personal stories of those who lived through this pivotal period in world history. This six-acre complex is dedicated to preserving the memory of those who served and sacrificed during the war.

GEORGE H.W. BUSH GALLERY

The state-of-the-art exhibit hall houses media-rich presentations, veteran testimonials, and displays of artifacts, including vehicles, aircraft and authentic military uniforms. Visitors can learn about the causes, significant events and the enduring relevance of the Pacific War.

A new addition to the family-friendly exhibit includes "The Rescue: A Submersive Experience," an interactive submarine exhibit

ADMIRAL NIMITZ GALLERY

Located in the historic 1890 Nimitz Steamboat Hotel, this gallery honors Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, a Fredericksburg native and the Naval Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific during WWII.

PACIFIC COMBAT ZONE

This two-acre indoor/outdoor exhibit is one of the museum's most popular attractions. Visitors can see:

- · A restored PT boat from WWII;
- A TBM Avenger aircraft;
- · A large-scale map of the Pacific The-

atre.

The PCZ also hosts living history reenactments showcasing U.S. forces attempting to capture a fortified Japanese position using period equipment and tactics.

NOTABLE EXHIBITS

Submarine exhibit: "The Rescue" is a multi-sensory, immersive experience where the true story of a WWII rescue operation comes to life.

Pearl Harbor: Features a Japanese midget submarine HA-19 that participated in the attack, and a hatch from the *USS Arizona*.

Battle of Midway: A dynamic three-screen presentation with show-controlled lighting and original music.

Iwo Jima: Includes an M2-2 flamethrower and memorabilia from the battle.

Okinawa: Offers a hands-on display of ground-level experiences.

ADDITIONAL FEATURES

Plaza of Presidents: Honors the 10 U.S. presidents who served during World War II.

Japanese Garden of Peace: A symbol of post-war friendship between Japan and the United States.

Memorial Courtyard: Pays tribute to those who served in the Asiatic-Pacific during WWII.









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U.S. HIGHWAY 290

Fort serves as Cornerstone

The first U.S. Army post on the Texas frontier resides inside the city limits of Fredericksburg — Fort Martin Scott.

The old fort has seen transformation under the Texas Historical Commission, since the state agency partnered with the City of Fredericksburg to manage and maintain the 176-year-old site last year.

The newly minted Fort Martin Scott State Historic Site's five-year plan includes all new programming. Visitors in 2025 will see more oral history programs, military fairs, rotating exhibits, technology programs and archaeological digs.

Long range plans for the fort include bringing in Longhorns and camels and a retail store.

HISTORY

All these programs will showcase the 14-acre property on the eastern edge of Fredericksburg along the old Pinta Trail.

The fort, settled in 1848 on Barons Creek, was built by the U.S. Army two years after John O. Meusebach and German settlers established the town of Fredericksburg.

The citadel, called Camp Houston, was the first in a string of forts established to help protect U.S. citizens moving west.

The camp was renamed Fort Martin Scott in December 1849 after Lt. Col. Martin Scott, who died while fighting in the Mexican-American War.

The infantry units were followed by horse-mounted dragoons, who led scouting patrols and escorts for the settlers

In 1850, Indian Agent John Rollins,

Army and Rangers representatives and interpreters met with a group of chiefs on the banks of the San Saba River and forged the Fort Martin Scott Treaty of 1850. Today, the Treaty Stone recognizing the pact is displayed in the fort visitor center.

By 1853, Fort Martin Scott became a supply depot and was permanently abandoned by the Army in 1866.

TRANSFORMATION

In 1870, John Braeutigam bought acreage that included the fort guard-house, which became the Braeutigam family home for 90 years. He created Braeutigam Gardens that included a saloon, store, racetrack and the area's first dance hall.

The first four Gillespie County fairs were held in the gardens. But the fairs and gardens ended with the robbery and murder of Braeutigam and his saloon in 1884.

The Braeutigam family farmed the land until 1959 when they sold it to the City of Fredericksburg.

OFFERINGS

The fort is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Saturday. Although structures are closed Sundays and Mondays, the grounds and walking trail remain open from dawn to dusk.


The site hosts daily 30-minute to hour-long guided tours at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Admission to the park is \$10 for adults, \$5 for ages five to 17 and free for those under five. Admission is free for those with a 78624 ZIP code on their driver's license and active duty military.


















The farm is named after the Sauer family who moved to the Hill Country in 1869. On their land, they built the two-story home, a smokehouse and tank house.

In 1900, the Sauers sold the property to the other namesake family, the Beckmanns. They lived and worked at the farm, planting cotton, building a new barn and adding a Victorian home before descendants eventually sold the site to TPWD.

PARK FACILITIES

The Visitor Center is the first stop for any tour to the LBJ Ranch which is a part of the Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park.

Attached to the Visitor Center is the Behrens Cabin, a two-room dogtrot cabin built during the 1840s by German immigrant Johannes Behrens.

There's also an outdoor amphitheater used for a variety of programs.

Numerous shaded picnic and rest areas, some with bathroom facilities, are available at the state park. Nearby are two lighted tennis courts.

The park's dining hall and group picnic area are available by reservation, and are

located on the banks of the Pedernales River, as well as a separate baseball diamond facility.

Fishing is allowed without a license from the banks of state park lands. However, those who go into the waterways on a boat must have a fishing license.

NATURE TRAILS

Elsewhere in the park, a winding nature trail leads walkers to a larger-than-life bronze statue of the former president overlooking the Pedernales River.

The trail also winds near a wildlife enclosure housing American bison and other areas with members of the Official State of Texas Longhorn Herd.

Another trail approximately a mile long is handicapped accessible and suitable for wheelchairs and strollers. It departs the Visitor Center and travels through fields of wildflowers and past the Texas Longhorns' pen to the Danz cabins.

Every trail in the park is marked with directional signs and markers giving brief highlights of the path. Leashed pets are welcomed but are not allowed inside buildings.

The smallest, and newest, Texas state park is around 20 minutes away from Fredericksburg.

Old Tunnel State Park is only 16.1 acres. The epicenter of the park is an abandoned railroad tunnel which provides a home to three million bats. The 920-foot-long tunnel was dug out mostly by hand to connect Fredericksburg to San Antonio by rail in 1913. By the 1940s, the railroad tunnel was abandoned.

It was purchased by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in 1991 to protect and manage the Mexican free-tail and cave myotis bats which had settled in the manmade tunnel. Locals discovered the bats after calling the fire department to investigate a plume of smoke. The plume turned out to be clouds of bats leaving the tunnel

to hunt.

The Mexican freetails summer in the Hill Country from May through October before heading south. The cave myotis bats have made the tunnel their home year round. The park also offers a 1.5-mile nature trail.

The tunnel is located at 10619 Old San Antonio Road and is open from sunrise to 5 p.m.

On May 1, visitors can watch the bats emerge from the tunnel for their nightly search for food.

Permits for entry into Old Tunnel State Park and fees for the bat viewing must be purchased online. No permits are sold onsite. Seats fill up fast for the bat viewing.

BAT FACTS

- There are over 1,300 different kinds of bats found in the world.
- Mexican free-tail bats can fly over 60 miles round-trip in an evening while foraging for insects.
- Mexican free-tail bats are important for keeping crop pests in check as they eat up to twothirds of their body weight in insects every night.
- Bats can see well and they also use echolocation or bio-sonar to help navigate and find food.
- The oldest living confirmed insectivorous bat lived for 41 years.





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Get Schooled in the Hill Country

Gillespie County Country Schools Trail | | historicschools.org

Hill Country students of the late 19th and early 20th centuries learned the basics of ABCs and arithmetic in their one-room schoolhouses.

Today, students use a variety of hightech in air-conditioned buildings, but the old schoolhouses are preserved to show students how education evolved.

The old school buildings predate the local school districts but still hold a special place in local history. Volunteers and former students help keep up these grounds and the public can revisit "the way things were" with a trip on the Gillespie County Country Schools Trail.

SCHOOLS TRAIL

The "schools trail" gives visitors and res-

idents, alike, a chance to venture into the early days of Texas, when German settlers came to the Texas Hill Country and established country schools to educate their children.

The driving trail includes schoolhouses such as Cave Creek, Cherry Mountain, Cherry Spring, Crabapple, Grapetown, Junction, Lower South Grape Creek, Luckenbach, Meusebach Creek, Nebgen, Pecan Creek, Rheingold, Williams Creek (Albert), White Oak, Willow City and Wrede

After the Gilmer-Aiken Laws of the 1950s and 1960s were passed, the schools were consolidated into the Fredericksburg Independent School District.

On Jan. 23, 2006, the Gillespie Coun-





ty Commissioners Court established the Gillespie County Country Schools Trail. This trail links the 16 historic former rural schools with the Vereins Kirche, a replica of the first school in the county.

FRIENDS GROUP

The Friends of Gillespie County Country Schools, along with several organizations, sponsors the trail and various activities throughout the year so that people can learn more about the county's educational history. The Friends consists of former students as well as community residents.

The properties are listed in the Register of National Historic Places and are on the Country School Association of America National Schoolhouse Registry.

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IN TOWN

Parks O'Plenty in Fredericksburg

Fredericksburg Parks and Recreation | fbgtx.org

Fredericksburg is home to nine parks, two outdoor swimming pools, eight ball fields, six tennis courts (with four striped for pickleball), seven soccer fields, nature trails, skate park, basketball pavilion and RV campground.

LADY BIRD JOHNSON MUNICIPAL PARK

The 330-acre Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park is the crown jewel of the City of Fredericksburg's parks system. Admission to the park is free.

Ten acres of the park are dedicated to the Fredericksburg Nature Center, which is home to 11 types of natural habitats. Three trails take hikers across Live Oak Creek, giving visitors a chance to experience the geologic and biologic diversity.

A 17-acre lake offers plenty of spots to fish. Motorboats are prohibited, as are trotlines and swimming.

Reservations for camping, use of the park's pavilions or other facilities can be made by calling the park at 830-997-4202, online, by email at ladybird-park@fbgtx.org.

CROSS MOUNTAIN

Cross Mountain Park is home to a marl and limestone hill with an elevation of 1.951 feet.

The park offers several trails, three picnic areas, an overlook and restrooms.

OLD FAIR PARK

At the corner of East Ufer and South Lincoln streets is Old Fair Park, a facility dedicated to sports.

Facilities include a lighted baseball and softball complex, concession stands, batting cage, skate park, soccer field and playgrounds.

Hours of operation are 5 a.m. to midnight, daily.

OAK CREST PARK

Oak Crest Park, located on Texas 16 South, is another city facility dedicated to sports.

Amenities include lighted baseball, softball and soccer fields, some with covered bleachers, a concession stand and a covered playground.

The playground, dedicated in 2012, is named for fallen soldier Chris Staats.

Reservations for Oak Crest Park can be made online.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PARK

Located at Fredericksburg Elementary School, this park is a collaboration between Fredericksburg Independent School District and the City of









Fredericksburg.

Amenities include a playground, pavilion, restrooms, trails, practice fields and an outdoor basketball court.

FRANTZEN PARK

Originally called the Orange Street Park, this quiet lot was donated to the city by Alex and Laura Frantzen in 1956.

The park includes a green space, walking path and picnic areas.

FREDERICKSBURG DOG PARK

The five-acre Fredericksburg Dog Park, located at Lady Bird Johnson Municipal Park, is fun for canines and humans,

alike

A separated small dog area is available for dogs 25 pounds or under. Trash bins and dog-waste bags are provided.

All dogs must be up to date on vaccinations, as required by the City of Fredericksburg Code of Ordinances.

LADY BIRD JOHNSON MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE

The 330-acre golf course spans over 6,600 yards and offers challenges for golfers of all skill levels.

The course offers private golf lessons and has a 1,660-square-foot banquet room that can host private events such

as anniversaries, wedding rehearsals, work meetings, class reunions and family reunions.


The banquet room has a wall of windows and high open-beam ceilings that provide views of the native landscape.

FREDERICKSBURG SOCCER COMPLEX

Opening soon is an 18-acre soccer field complex that includes six full-sized fields, three are lighted, with an entrance to the facility from Fair Drive.

The complex is a partnership between the City of Fredericksburg and Hill Country Youth Soccer.






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Library Goes Beyond Books

Housed in a historic building, Pioneer Memorial Library continues to serve the people of Gillespie County by providing a wide array of resources to enrich the community.

"As a hub for information, education, recreation and culture, we offer a diverse collection of books, periodicals, audiovisual materials and technology," said Librarian Erika Caputo. "Our goal is to promote inclusive learning and offer quality services that enhance the lives of all patrons."

HISTORY

The historic building served as the Gillespie County Courthouse from 1882 until 1939, when the courthouse shifted to its current location next door. Various governmental organizations occupied the building until it was closed in 1963.

Two years later, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene McDermott of Dallas funded the preservation of the building so that it could be used as a public library. It was dedicated in May 1967. It was restored and rededicated a second time in 1984.

SERVICES

Adults and children six years old and older who live in Gillespie County can obtain a library card at no charge. All children must have their card signed by a parent or guardian when filling out a card application.

Visitors to Gillespie County who stay for three months or more can receive a card and non-residents of Gillespie County (residents of Blanco, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Llano and Mason counties) can obtain a card for a \$5 fee.

Books may be checked out for two weeks, and if not requested by another library user, may be renewed for another two weeks.

ADULTS

Adult fiction and non-fiction books, books on CD, large print books, reference material, the Texas collection, magazines and newspapers are located on the second floor. Current periodicals, covering a wide range of subjects, are available for reading in the library and for home use. All but the latest issues are circulated. The library subscribes to the Wall Street Journal and the Fredericksburg Standard-Radio Post. The library holds back issues of the Fredericksburg papers on microfilm back to 1890.

YOUTH

Children's books can be found in the young people's room on the first floor. Picture books, easy readers, fiction and nonfiction for older children are available. A story hour is offered for preschool and kindergarten children on Tuesdays at 10 a.m. during the school year. The library participates in the Summer Reading Program sponsored by the Friends of Pioneer Memorial Library. Reading certificates are presented to those who complete the program.


LIBRARY BOOK STORE

The library also sells gently used books. Proceeds from the book sales go toward the summer program and other library programs.

FRIENDS OF PML

In addition to being a department of the County of Gillespie, the library is supported by the Friends of Pioneer Memorial Library.

These volunteers support the library through fundraising and advocacy efforts. The programs Friends hosts include: September sidewalk and book store book sales, summer program, staff appreciation, annual library scholarship for seniors and library supplies.


This year, for the first time, many Main Street restaurants will have specials for festival-goers who show their book festival attendee badge.

Presidential Residences

Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park | nps.gov/lyjo

The home of the 36th President of the United States, Lyndon Baines Johnson, is sprawled over two visitor areas — in Johnson City and Stonewall. The Lyndon B. Johnson National Historical Park includes his birthplace, the Texas White House and his boyhood home.

LBJ RANCH

The LBJ Ranch, located at 1472 State Park Road 52 in Stonewall, is the birth and death place of the former president.

Visitors can tour the ranch in their vehi-

cle, with stops along the way, including the president's birthplace, the Johnson Family Cemetery and the president's first school.

The Texas White House and Airplane Hangar are temporarily closed to the public while they undergo restorations.

The ranch remains open seven days a week, and free driving permits and maps can be picked up just down the road at the LBJ State Park and Historic Site Visitor Center, 199 Park Road 52, Stonewall. More information on the state park can be

found elsewhere in the visitor guide.

Driving permits can be picked up between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. Ranch entrance gates are open from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and the ranch exit gate closes at 5 p.m.

JOHNSON CITY

The other half of the park, located in Johnson City, includes the national park visitor center, LBJ's boyhood home and the Johnson Settlement, where the president's grandparents settled in the 1860s.










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

Be Enchanted at the Rock

Enchanted Rock State Natural Area | tpwd.texas.gov

One of the biggest draws to the Hill Country is the natural beauty. Enchanted Rock State Natural Area (ERSNA) is a towering example of this.

The area, run by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD), is one of the most popular parks in the state. Situated 18 miles north of Fredericksburg, it draws an average of 300,000 visitors each year.

Enchanted Rock is the umbrella term for the surrounding trails and camping sites at the foot of the eponymous rock. The pink granite batholith reaches an elevation of 1,825 feet. The most popular of the area's hiking trails, summit trail challenges hikers with steep inclines.

Including summit, hikers can enjoy the nearly 11 miles of hiking trails, which range in difficulty. Rock climbers can try their hand at conquering the rock, after notifying the park office.

Enchanted Rock is one of the TPWD International Dark Sky Sanctuaries, making it ideal for stargazing.

The natural area announced last year that it will nearly triple in size after acquiring two adjacent land parcels.

ERSNA added 630+ acres to the park's



south and purchased a 3,000-acre ranch on the park's north side. Both promise more future hiking trails and camping opportunities.


Rock climbers also use the park to practice their skills. (Check with the headquarters for details.)


Admission and parking are free for those two days. There will be door prizes hourly, a silent auction and hourly drawings during the show.

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

Shrine to the Good Times

Hill Country travelers frequent Luckenbach, just like Willie, Waylon and the boys did in 1977.

Known for its "Everybody's Somebody" attitude and live entertainment, Luckenbach Texas is a popular destination for music fans, bikers and all those interested in discovering the tiny town in the tune heard by millions.

With its store, dance hall and picnic tables underneath arching live oak trees, Luckenbach (a sign jokes "Population 3") is a destination in its own.

Open daily at 9 a.m., the family-friendly store offers visitors an old-fashioned experience and merchandise ranging from the nostalgic to items bearing the town's oval-shaped logo.

The town also hosts regional and national acts. During quieter times, one can find a picker's circle for those who want to swap tunes and musically mingle with

the locals.

With nearly daily performances on the outside stage or in the dancehall, visitors can sit back and enjoy a beverage of choice while enjoying the musicians who provide tunes with a Texas flair.

HISTORY

Luckenbach began in 1852 when Jacob Luckenbach and his brothers, William and August, moved to the area from Fredericksburg and began farming. William Luckenbach opened a post office under the name of South Grape Creek in 1854 which operated for 11 years.

In 1886, August Engel Jr. reopened a post office for the community along with a general store in the Engel homestead. It was named Luckenbach by Minna Engel, who had recently married Carl Albert Luckenbach.

Engel and his descendants later moved

the post office and general store down the street and added a blacksmith shop, dance hall and cotton gin.


In the 1970s, the Engel family sold the town to Hondo Crouch, Kathy Morgan and Guich Koock. During the years that followed, Luckenbach gained national attention as a "metropolis of mirth," thanks in large part to Crouch's far-reaching humor and charismatic personality.

Jerry Jeff Walker later enhanced the town's reputation by recording his live album, "Viva Terlingua," there 50 years ago. From 1995-1999, Willie Nelson held his storied Fourth of July Picnic at Luckenbach.

Today, one can find local and traveling musicians on stage or at the Picker's Circle. Hundreds frequent the dance hall or enjoy other calendar events each day.

The "Crown Prince" and "Mayor of Luckenbach," Hondo Crouch was more than a rancher, writer and swimming coach — he was the freewheeling spirit who put Luckenbach Texas, on the map. Born John Russell Crouch in 1916, the Hill Country native grew up in Hays County and earned the nickname "Hondo" along the way. He served in the Navy during World War II, then returned home to ranch and coach swimming, becoming a well-loved figure for his humor and tall tales.

In 1970, with friends Kathy Morgan and Guich Koock, Crouch bought the tiny town of Luckenbach — a general store, dance hall and post office wrapped into one. What started as a whimsical purchase turned into a legendary gathering spot. Crouch declared himself the "mayor" and "Imagineer," spinning offbeat proclamations and hosting events like the Luckenbach World's Fair and the Mud Dauber Festival.

His easygoing charm and knack for storytelling drew musicians and dreamers, helping transform the sleepy community into a Texas cultural landmark. Though he died in 1976, Crouch's influence lived on. Luckenbach became immortalized in song and spirit, standing for the kind of laid-back, slightly offbeat Texas lifestyle he embodied.

For many, Hondo Crouch wasn't just from Luckenbach — he was Luckenbach.

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

The 55th annual LBJ Tree Lighting event will be held Sunday, Dec. 15, at 5:30 p.m.

Taking place at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park and Historic Site in Stone-wall, the event will give locals and visitors a chance to enjoy carolers, a live nativity, Santa Claus, refreshments and, of course, the tree lighting itself.

The evening event is a holiday tradition begun by President Lyndon B. Johnson and his family.

The annual celebration takes place in the courtyard of the state park's visitor center, located just east of Stonewall off U.S. 290 East.

Members of the Johnson family traditionally are on hand that night at the park, which is named for the 36th U.S. president, to take part in the ceremony.

In conjunction with the tree lighting, a short program is held in which representatives from Stonewall community churches participate.

Elsewhere on the grounds, members of the Catholic Youth Organization will present a live nativity scene.

There, visitors will see a traditional German Christmas scene. Standing in the parlor will be a Christmas tree decorated with cutout cookies, popcorn chains, apples, oranges and lighted candles.

The tradition of lighted candles on Christmas trees started in Germany, which eventually turned into today's electric lights.

In another room, visitors will find angel chimes and an advent wreath made of cedar. In the center of the kitchen, the dining table will be laden with foods that have been prepared by park employees.


